REACHING HOME COMMUNITY TEMPLATE Winter 2023-24 Unsheltered Homelessness Response Funding Investment Plan

Introduction:

To further support communities in keeping **people experiencing unsheltered homelessness safe** this winter, a one-time top-up of \$100 million has been reallocated by Infrastructure Canada (INFC) to Reaching Home: Canada's Homelessness Strategy for 2023-24.

To access the funding allocation, the Reaching Home (RH) funding recipient (hereinafter "the Recipient) must submit an Investment Plan by January 12, 2023.

The following Investment Plan template asks for an outline of how the Recipient is planning to invest funding in order to support a response to unsheltered homelessness this winter 2023-2024. The funding must be **expended by April 30, 2024**.

Applicability:

An Investment Plan is required to obtain the Winter 2023-24 Unsheltered Homelessness Response under the Designated Communities, Territorial Homelessness, and Indigenous Homelessness streams (outside of Quebec).

If you are the Community Entity (CE) for both the Designated Communities and Indigenous Homelessness streams in the community, only one completed template is required.

In communities where there are both the Designated Community and the Indigenous Homelessness CEs (outside of Quebec), a joint submission is encouraged but not required, as the review of submissions will be conducted at the community-level. If this is a joint submission, it should identify how the 2023-24 Winter top up funding will be divided between CEs.

Approval/Submission Process:

Completed Investment Plans require the approval of the CE or the Entities as appropriate. That said, it is required that the Investment Plan is shared with the Community/Regional Advisory Board (CAB) and endorsement by the Board is encouraged.

Completed Investment Plans must be submitted to your INFC Engagement and Program Officer (EPO) by **January 12**, **2024** (11:59 p.m. PST). If your community does not require all of the 2023-24 Winter top up funding, or a portion of it, to support unsheltered homelessness responses, please confirm via email with your Engagement and Program Officer (EPO) as soon as possible.

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Notes on use of the information submitted in the investment plan:

The Investment Plan information will be shared with officials within INFC and may be shared with officials in other federal departments, provincial and/or territorial governments, and/or Members of Parliament. It may also be used and/or disclosed for policy analysis and/or research purposes. The Investment Plan is also subject to the *Access to Information Act* ("*ATIA*").

This funding will support Waterloo Region respond to unsheltered/winter homelessness plans in the following ways:

- Hotel and motel rooms have been used by the Region and its partners to provide temporary accommodations to individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness and/or as winter overflow spaces. This funding will help address some of the costs associated with these services.
- Several shelter providers operate winter overflow programs and expand the number of shelter spaces available in the fall/winter months. This funding will be used to support the rental of hotel/motel rooms and/or operating/staffing funding to support individuals who would otherwise experience unsheltered homelessness.
- Region of Waterloo staff and community partners have coordinated the purchase and distribution of winter warming packages to individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness/staying in encampments. A portion of this funding will go towards these expenses.
